Sunday 14th May 2023 marks 24 years of Keikokai. Normally the Sunday classes are for Brown Belts and Black Belts only, but on this special occasion we hope you will all come along to our training session. It was in 1999 that John Burke took over, keeping the club going once Phil Trebilcock retired, and he's done so nonstop ever since. Teaching for Phil before that, and teaching for Jim Harvey sensei before that means that we are approaching 30 years of teaching Shotokan Karate for John, who is now graded 6th Dan and accorded the title Renshi. His actual start in the martial arts was in 1982 at the Renshinkai club of Peter Maduro sensei in Croydon, Surrey. In the intervening 40 years he has trained with the best teachers and taught seminars across the world, including in Japan. Of course, being led to the teaching and guidance of Anthony Blades 7th Dan Kyoshi and having the support of Jim Harvey 4th dan sensei was instrumental in getting Keikokai to its current stage of development. We hope you will join us to celebrate and make sure that the years to come are even greater than the ones that have passed. Our club, the Keikokai, is represented by the growth and development of our members, and under the instructors' leadership we'll grow stronger together.

Tsuki doesn't mean punch. It can be written as zuki but it describes a tubular thrust.

Uke doesn't mean block. Ukeru is a verb for receive. Receiving techniques can be very different to blocking them.

Keri means kick. Keri waza are kicking techniques. The k only becomes a softened g sound when it becomes a suffix to another word. Be very careful describing anything as Geri waza. It doesn't mean kicking Congratulations all, and now the hard techniques.
